2024 Committee/Duly Convened Council Meeting Schedule

Haisla Nation Council is the elected decision-making body that sets the overall direction of the Haisla Nation in economic, organizational and community planning. Two committees are branches of Council:

#### The Executive Committee (EC)

The EC acts as an intermediary body to ensure the operational side of the organization is
performing in a satisfactory way through monitoring. The role of the EC is to set the expectations
and monitor the performance of the Administration. The EC is accountable to elected Chief and
Council, and primary responsibilities include developing and proposing recommendations to
Council and tracking the performance of the Administration, ensuring expectations are being
met.

#### The Stakeholders Relations Committee (SRC)

 The SRC's role is to develop recommendations and action plans to put forward to the Council for consideration. As the name suggests, they work with external groups and stakeholders with a mission to foster the creation of positive, sustainable economic opportunities to benefit Haisla members.

The Committees meet regularly. To streamline time and process the Committees hold their meetings together to reach their common goal of being efficient and timely. In this streamlined process, to continue with the goal of being efficient and timely, all Duly Convened Council meetings immediately follow the Committees meeting.

Monthly Committee/Duly Convened Council meetings are scheduled for the third (3rd) Wednesday of every month unless noted otherwise.

Haisla Nation Council is committed to keeping our membership informed of upcoming Committee/Duly Convened Council meetings with the following schedule of dates for 2024. These dates are also posted on haisla.ca and can be found in our calendar of events. Please note dates are subject to change and an update will be made on the haisla.ca calendar if such changes are required.

### **Haisla Nation Council**

On October 2 and 3, 2024, Haisla Nation Council hosted their Annual General Meeting. Over the course of two evenings, elected chief and council along with all Haisla Nation departments successfully presented their updates for the fiscal year 2023-2024. Below are the key highlights from each department within the organization.

### Organizational Highlights

#### Haisla Nation Elected Chief and Council

- Formed yáq<sup>w</sup>a Development Corporation (YDC).
- Selected Board members for YDC.
- Completed the Community Economic Development Initiative (CEDI) program with the District of Kitimat.

#### Administration

- Launched a new, responsive Haisla.ca website with improved navigation, a search-enabled staff directory, and event calendar.
- Contracted OneFeather to manage the June 2023 General Election, filling five Councillor seats. 488 ballots were cast from 1,673 eligible voters.

#### **Community Development**

- Completed the Wathl Creek walking bridge.
- Completed the construction of Eagle View Apartments and filled units with tenants.

#### Culture and Language

- Continued reconciliatory work with the District of Kitimat, including collaborative projects and updated street signs.
- Launched the Haisla Language Cloud website with language resources, a digital dictionary, and an educational portal.

#### Education (K-12)

- Launched a successful food share program.
- Supported 44 children at C'imo'ca Childcare Centre.
- Provincial Local Education Agreement in place with Coast Mountain School District.

#### Employment and Training (Including Post Secondary)

- Multiple members completed certificates, trades, bachelor's, and master's degrees.
- Haisla members completed Heavy Equipment Operator certification on reserve.
- Successful job referrals were made to Joint Venture Partners















### **Haisla Nation Council**

#### Environment

- Launched curbside recycling and organics collection in Kitamaat Village.
- The Environment Manager presented accomplishments on climate action at the COP 28 conference in Dubai.

#### Finance

- Processed \$21 million in Per Capita Distribution payments.
- Secured cost-saving insurance and signed a Capital Asset Management system contract.
- Achieved a successful audit and made progress toward First Nations Financial Management Systems Certification.

#### Haisla Harbour and Fisheries Operations

- Celebrated a strong oolichan return to Kemano.
- Secured 20-year funding for resource stewardship and conservation.
- Welcomed new staff members in early 2024.

#### Health

- Provided 2,606 encounters with community members.
- Coordinated 1712 travel packages for patient travel.
- Hosted support groups to support community wellness.

#### Human Resources

- Selected a Human Resources Information System to implement.
- Supported Council and Executive Management to conduct an organizational review.
- Improved access to Jordan's Principle funding by hiring a Coordinator and ARC Administrator.



#### Lands

- Issued the first permit under the Land Code to a Haisla entrepreneur for Cedar Salvage.
- Completed LNGC permit reviews, with gas flaring starting in September 2024, and Coastal GasLink Phase 1 finished.













### xá'isla Culture & Language Department

The xā'isla Culture and Language Department, in collaboration with the Tamitik Status of Women and the District of Kitimat, created meaningful spaces for individuals to come together during the last weekend of September. These gatherings were held to remember and honor both those who survived and those who did not return from residential schools, as well as their families. The events provided an opportunity to share truths, learn, and move forward collectively in the spirit of healing and reconciliation.

Preparations for the feast began on Friday at ćimáuća, with community members and neighbours sharing the workload, in laughter and camaraderie. Saturday's gathering featured a traditional meal at the Haisla Recreation Centre, with feast stew as the main course, topped off with a dessert of soap berries. Attendees were gifted a ceramic soup bowl and spoon, inscribed with the phrase "wísenis hémsa," meaning "let's eat!" Sunday was filled with learning opportunities, local vendors, and the rich sounds of drumming and singing. The Haisla Recreation Centre came alive with the resilience and strength of the xá'isla people, joined by the Laxgalts'ap dance group.

On Monday, the morning began with a walk to honour Residential School Survivors and those who did not make it home. The walk led to the site where Nathan Wilson's "Bridging our núyem" pole was raised. Nathan, a xā'isla artist, along with assistant carvers Alexander Erikson and Candace Green, were present to witness the historic pole raising on his Uncle Chris' wawais, marking the site of the new Haisla bridge.

The weekend concluded with a shared dinner at the Kitimat Riverlodge Recreation Centre, bringing everyone together in unity and healing. It was a weekend of witnessing truths and exploring ways to journey together toward reconciliation. As the final day came to a close, there was a shared sense of hope and determination to continue this journey forward, together.

### **Department Update**

The MK Bay Wood Removal Project has successfully concluded. Over the course of ten weeks, six Haisla members were employed, taking on tasks such as chopping, splitting, and distributing wood to everyone on our distribution list.

We are pleased to announce that a total of 57 homes benefited from the processed wood.

In all, our team delivered 286 loads of chopped and split wood.

On behalf of the Lands Department, we extend our heartfelt gratitude to our crew for their dedication throughout this project. Without their efforts, this initiative would not have come to fruition and home owners now have a supply of wood for the upcoming winter months.





The Dangerous Tree Removal Project aimed to carry out tree hazard risk assessments in our community, ensuring the safety of our residents and their properties. This initiative lasted for 25 days, with the MK Wood Removal Crew assisting the Tree Removal Crew throughout the entire process.

In total, 57 community members sought assessments and had hazardous trees safely removed from their properties.

We extend our gratitude to our crew, as their efforts in eliminating dangerous trees have contributed to creating a safer environment for both homeowners and the broader community.

### Action Canada and the Public Policy Forum Lecture



In a room filled with Action Canada Fellowship participants, whose backgrounds reflected the rich diversity of Canada, elected Chief Councillor Crystal Smith delivered a lecture centered on the group's study theme, "Reconciliation and the Future of the Resource Sector." In her address, she highlighted the importance of Indigenous-led resource development, the resilience of Indigenous communities and took pride in the Haisla Nation's path toward economic self-determination.

Sarah Robinson, a former Action Canada Fellow 2014-2015, dedicated herself to fostering dialogue among policymakers regarding Indigenous history, reconciliation, and action. This conference was inspired and shared in her memory. The event was a collaborative endeavor between Action Canada and the Public Policy Forum, in partnership with Indspire: Rivers to Success, Johnson & Johnson, and Heritage Canada.

As part of their Fellowship, the group participates in study tours across various regions in Canada. Their visit to our community was their fourth study tour, aimed at connecting with different First Nations and gaining insights into the industry. 
# HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS



Ensure that adults are aware of the whereabouts of children. It's best for a parent or responsible adult to accompany young children while visiting each door.

Always walk on the sidewalks and avoid the street. If there is no sidewalk, stay at the edge of the road, facing oncoming traffic. Before crossing, remember to look both ways. Refrain from cutting through yards and never cross between parked cars. Drivers should exercise additional caution on Halloween.





Trick-or-treaters should be both visible and able to see clearly. Opt for face makeup instead of masks, as masks can obstruct vision. Provide flashlights to illuminate their path. Incorporate reflective tape on costumes and treat bags for added safety. Encourage everyone to wear light-colored clothing for better visibility.

An adult should inspect the treats before eating. Be sure to remove any loose candy, open packages, and potential choking hazards. Dispose of any items with brand names that are unfamiliar to you.
